

## Otellie Pasiyava Loloma



Otellie Pasiyava Loloma (1922-1993), Hopi Pueblo, was an artist who specialized in traditional Hopi pottery and dance<sup>1,2</sup>. She also helped her husband, Charles Loloma, on jewlry design<sup>2</sup>. She began playing with clay as a child, but did not start formal training in pottery until she was 23, when she was invited to study at the School of the American Craftsman at Alfred University<sup>2,3</sup>. She went on to continue her education at Northern Arizona University and the College of Santa Fe <sup>2,3</sup>. In the 1950s, she and her husband opened a shop at the Kiva Craft Center in Scottsdale, Arizona<sup>2,3</sup>. She was a pioneering artist at the Southwest Indian Art Project in Tucson, Arizona, a summer institute funded by the Rockefeller Foundation in 1960-1961<sup>2,3</sup>. In 1991, she earned a Women's Caucus for Art Lifetime Achievement Award<sup>3</sup>. She also has been featured in the ABC documentary "With These Hands: The Rebirth of the American Craftsman"<sup>2</sup>. She taught Native American dance with Josephine Myers-Wapp and had the honor of performing at the White House and the 1968 Summer Olympics with their students<sup>2,3</sup>. Her works are featured in a permanent collection at the Museum of the American Indian and the Philbrook Museum of Art, among other institutions<sup>3</sup>.
